Dec. 2007

NYSDEC forms an Office of Invasive Species Coordination to serve as a single point of contact and ensures coordination for New York State on all invasive species matters, in statewide, inter-state, national and international settings. The mission of the OISC is to prevent or minimize the harm caused by invasive species on New York's environment by collaborating and coordinating efforts with all stakeholders, including biologists, foresters, universities, other state agencies, and non-profit organizations to support research and raise public suaveness of the AIS issue, Specific tasks have included:

- Creation of a New York Invasive Species Research Institute Cornell University.
- Creation of an integrated map that pinpoints invasives in an near New York (iMapInvasives.org), and
- Support of Partnerships for Regional Invasive Species
 Management (DPISMs)
